Black College Bowl II

Five Hartford 8th graders are currently studying for the Black Knowledge Bowl II (BKB2). BKB2 will be held at the Milwaukee Public Museum on Friday, February 26th. Last year, there were teams from 12 schools, and organizers hope it grows this year. Six Flags Reading Club

Hartford is participating in Six Flags' Read to Succeed Reading Club. The Club encourages kids in grades K through 6 to read for fun. Every student who participates will receive a free ticket to Six Flags upon the completion of 6 hours of recreational reading before the end of February. Children in classrooms that are participating will receive a reading log to bring The child then logs 360 minutes (6 home. hours) of recreational reading - books, magazines, newspapers, or comic books. An adult initials the log to verify that the child met the requirement for 6 hours of reading. Though reading for homework does not count, other types of reading can add to the total whether the child reads alone or with an adult. Because late entries will not be eligible for a Six Flags' ticket, be sure to submit the completed form by the deadline date on the form. The Reading Club coordinator for Hartford is Ms. Lathrop, so any questions may be directed to her.

UWM's College for Kids

UWM has released the schedule for the 30th year of College for Kids, an opportunity for motivated and interested children to pursue academic enrichment in the summertime. Kids entering grades K5 to 8th grade can explore art, computers, languages, culture, music, science, and social sciences at UWM's campus (familiar to most Hartford students). Grade-appropriate sessions are two hours a day for 1 or 2 weeks. Students may attend a single session, or may combine sessions for a full day. Sessions cost \$89 to \$149, depending on subject and materials. The prices have not gone up since last year! Before and After Care is an additional fee. New this year, College for Kids is offering Family University. Family U. is a two-day camp for families to grow together. Kids attend classes over the course of two days, August 9th and 10th, with parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles, or adult siblings. As long as there is at least one adult per two children, any combination will work! Each day features an educational topic for the family to explore together: chemistry, dance, genealogy, theatre, science, astronomy, architecture, engineering, and more. If you choose, you can even stay in the dorms together. The cost is \$185 for two people, with additional adults for \$125 and additional children for \$85.

For the second year in a row, Hartford University School's Author's Night was entitled "Snuggle Up and Read" and featured special guests from the Milwaukee Bucks. 

Congratulations for showing such amazing progress in the first semester! Expect your teachers to continue to challenge you and push for excellence and progress in reading.

Be sure to review your child's report card to see how your child's reading skills measure up. The reading level (except for the youngest grades) is shown with the grade and semester (1st or 2nd). For example, a 3.2 reading level is the 2nd semester of third grade, and a 5.1 level is the 1st semester of fifth grade. If you have any questions about your child's reading level or literacy program, please contact his or her teacher.

Hartford's Budget Decisions for 2010-11

With the rising costs of benefits in the district, Hartford had some difficult decisions to make regarding next year's budget. The administration, staff, parents, and Governance Council at Hartford have once again proven that they are creative and wise people who can maintain a high quality of education, even in the midst of a shrinking budget. Facing the reality of nearly \$500,000 of budget cuts, everyone knew that sacrifices would be made, but a high-quality urban education at Hartford University School was not to be given up. The Governance Council was committed to retain a full-time art and music program at Hartford; if anything, there will be more of the arts next year. However, there will be some changes, subject to the ever-changing state, city, and district budgets:

- The Guidance position (currently held by Ms. Kush) will be reduced to 3 days a week. The Governance Committee indicated that restoring some time to this position would be a priority if some additional money would become available.
- The Bookkeeper position (currently held by Ms. Tassara) will be reduced to half-time.
- Three of the ten paraprofessional staff positions will be lost.
- The Physical Education position (currently held by Mr. Wamser) will be reduced to one day a week. Mr. Wamser will be retiring after this year. Because state law requires middle school students to receive physical education from a certified P.E. teacher, a P.E. teacher will come one day a week for middle school students. Elementary physical education will be conducted by classroom teachers. However, Hartford has creatively decided to use this opportunity to bring regular movement and dance instruction (from ballet to hip hop to yoga) to engage primary grade students in physical activity.
- The Reading Resource Teacher position (currently held by Ms. Oulahan) will be eliminated.
- The Split Classroom position (currently held by Ms. Hurst) will be eliminated. One of the reasons that Hartford has had to make some cuts is because Hartford was budgeted 14 less students by MPS, effectively eliminating this classroom. That decision is currently being challenged by the Hartford administration, and there is some hope that the position may be restored.

Many parents have asked what they can do to help. There are some small things you can do to help address the changes:

- Make sure your children are ready for school. Everyone's instruction time can be maximized by having all kids who attend school every day, on time, with their homework done and ready to hand in.
- Please respond quickly and completely to all requests from school. Teachers who spend a lot of time making additional requests for permission slips, homework, or information from parents have less time for instruction.
- Consider becoming a coach of one of Hartford's teams. With Mr. Wamser retiring, many of those teams will not exist if a parent does not step forward to coach. You don't need to be the most talented athlete to give kids their earliest instruction in a sport.
- Spend time reading with your kids. Losing the Reading Resource position may mean less reading support at Hartford, but parents can help make up for that by reading with their kids, taking them to the library, and instilling a love of reading.

PSO Activities

The Hartford PSO currently has \$7,290.64 in its bank account. The PSO has recently used the money raised from the Mr. Z's pizza sale to pay for shirts for the Lego Robotics Team (\$53), registration and awards for the Spelling Bee (\$141), basketball team shirts (\$395), and the registration and materials for the Black Knowledge Bowl (\$85). The PSO also voted to pay for more Hartford Hurrahs and for food for Family Heritage Night at the end of the month. You can help decide how our money is being spent to support Hartford by attending PSO meetings. The dates and times for meetings appear on the front page of the newsletters. We hope to see you on March 4!

There were 33 students representing 7 districts in southeastern Wisconsin, but Hartford was the only MPS school represented. Urban Ecology Center Camps

The Urban Ecology Center (UEC) in Riverside Park and Washington Park is already planning summer camps. Campers of all ages will enjoy a variety of outdoor games, nature exploration, hiking, canoeing, fishing, swimming, and songs. Older campers will also get to kayak, bike, and go on an overnight camping trip. Sessions run throughout the summer for a variety of age groups. Costs vary from \$135/week for some half-day camps to \$230 for some full day camps. All camps cost less for UEC members. Scholarships are available for students who are eligible for reduced lunch at school, and preference is given to students who attend partner schools like Hartford. As part of Hartford's partnership with the UEC, all Hartford students have visited their Riverside Park site and are familiar with the great learning opportunities that exist there.
