Hartford Spelling Bee

The Second Annual Scripps Spelling Bee was held at Hartford on December 17th. After weeks of studying, 6 middle schoolers and 15 elementary students finally got a chance to meet the challenge of spelling on stage. Thanks to all of the participating students and parents for their hard work. Though there was only one winner at each level, all of the students greatly improved their spelling skills. Both of the winners received a trophy and a year's subscription to Britannica Online. Congratulations!

Among the middle school students (grades 6-8), there were 4 rounds in which all of the students got to spell. Once there were only 2 students remaining, Curtis Cook and Oscar Sprangers, they began a series of 10 championship rounds. In the end, Oscar Sprangers (a 6th grader in Ms. Rowen's classroom) was named the middle school champion. The runner-up was Curtis Cook (a 7th grader in Ms. Lane's class). Both of them will proceed to CESA's Regional Spelling Bee on February 3rd at Greendale Middle School. Congratulations to both of you!

On the elementary side, there were 15 participants in grades 3 through 5 who went for 6 rounds before there were only two spellers left. In the end, Katie Jackson (a 5th grader in Mr. Moses' room) was named the champion and Sierra Rojas (a 3rd grader in Ms. Kazmierski's class) was the runner-up. Katie will represent Hartford at the Regional Spelling Bee on February 3rd at Greendale Middle School. Great work!

Thanks to Maria Dixon, the parent volunteer who coordinated the Spelling Bee and handled all of the preparations. She has been the driving force behind the Spelling Bee at Hartford for the last 2 years and deserves a lot of praise for her commitment and passion. Thanks to Mr. Dunning, Ms. Kelsch, and Ms. Lathrop, who volunteered to be judges. Thanks to parent Roderick Rush, who volunteered to be the pronouncer at the Bee. 

The Mary Horwitt Piano Scholarship

Scholarship applications are being accepted for MPS students in grades 6 through 11 who take piano lessons. Students at beginning, intermediate, or advanced levels may apply. The Mary Horwitt Piano Scholarship is a \$1,000 scholarship toward piano study at the Wisconsin Conservatory of Music during the 2010-2011 school year. Since the scholarship was created 9 years ago, more than 30 MPS students have received the Mary Horwitt Piano Scholarship. Last year, four MPS students had the opportunity to study at the Conservatory through the scholarship. Students who are interested should request an application from Ms. Poytinger. The application must include a one-page personal statement of the student's musical background, interest, and goals; a letter of recommendation from the student's piano teacher; and a three to five minute audio tape of the student playing the piano. All materials should be sent to Karen Deschere at the Milwaukee Conservatory of Music (1584 N. Prospect Ave.). The deadline for submitting scholarship applications is March 1, 2010. ACE Visits

The ACE (Arts in Community Education) program continues to bring music to the classroom. The kindergarten students continued their year-long focus on the different families within music (brass, woodwinds, etc...). On Jan. 7th, some of the musicians from the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra with low instruments came to visit the kindergarten classes. They were able to let the students hear where the bass sounds of the orchestra come from. The 1st graders have been learning about musicians as storytellers in this year's curriculum. Their visit from the Milwaukee Jazz Experience on Jan. 12th drew on the extensive history of jazz to show how a tale can be told through music.

Six Flags Reading Club

Hartford is participating in Six Flags' Read to Succeed Reading Club. The Club encourages kids in grades K through 6 to read for fun. Every student who participates will receive a free ticket to Six Flags upon the completion of 6 hours of recreational reading before the end of February. Children in classrooms that are participating will receive a reading log to bring The child then logs 360 minutes (6 hours) of recreational reading — books, magazines, newspapers, or comic books. An adult initials the log to verify that the child met the requirement for 6 hours of reading. Though reading for homework does not count, other types of reading can add to the total whether the child reads alone or with an adult. Because late entries will not be eligible for a Six Flags' ticket, be sure to submit the completed form by the deadline date on the form. The Reading Club coordinator for Hartford is Ms. Lathrop, so any questions may be directed to her.

Because of budget cuts, there have been some changes to the schedule of hours at Milwaykee Public Libraries. If you use the libraries, you may want to call the library hours hotline at 286-3287 before heading out. You can also pick up a schedule of hours at your local library. To summarize, most libraries will open for shorter hours each day (generally 10-5 or 1-8). Other than the Central and Center Street libraries, Milwaukee's libraries will be closed either Fridays (Atkinson, Bay View, East, Mill Road, Zablocki) or Saturdays (Capitol, Forest Home, King, Tippecanoe, Villard, and Washington). Libraries will only have Sunday hours from 1-5 pm, October through April. There will also be some furlough days when all libraries will be closed (April 5, May 28, July 2, September 3). Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be Safe

Hartford continues to use PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports) to encourage positive behaviors at school. Rather than just punishing or correcting negative or disruptive behaviors, PBIS seeks to encourage and support positive behaviors. The focus is for students to be respectful, be responsible, and be safe. Just as the teachers can talk to students about what those behaviors look like in the classroom, on the playground, or in the hallway, parents can tell kids what it means to be respectful, responsible, and safe at home. Tell your children exactly how you expect them to behave in the car, at the dinner table, and while playing outside. Model the appropriate behavior yourself and support your children when they demonstrate the proper behavior. Following the PBIS expectations may look slightly different at home than at school:

PBIS Expectation	Home Examples
Be Respectful	Ask instead of demand
	Say "please" and "thank you"
	Look at adults when they are talking
Be Responsible	Clean up toys when finished playing
	Do chores around the house
	Wash hands after using the bathroom
Be Safe	Walk up and down stairs
	Look both ways when crossing the street
	Use eating utensils properly

Students are being rewarded at school when they display positive behaviors at school; why not reward them at home? Home rewards do not need to cost anything. Consider rewards such as:

- Let him/her stay up 10 minutes past bedtime
- Cook your child's favorite meal
- Give your child extra computer time or reading time at home
- Let him/her get out of doing chores for a day
- Color, draw, play a game, or read with your child
- Send a note to your child's teacher telling him/her what a great job the child is doing at home

MPS School Selection - Invite Friends to Hartford!

January is once again the time of year for selecting a school in MPS. The three-choice school selection program runs from January 11th through the 29th. Families with school-aged children in Milwaukee should have received a booklet entitled *Directions*. Also available at libraries, the booklet lists all of the MPS schools and contains the Three-Choice Selection form. If your child will continue to attend Hartford next year, you do **not** need to re-enroll your child or do anything. Currently registered Hart-

Hartford will be hosting an open house in May for parents and families who would like to know more about Hartford—those who either signed up for the 2010-11 school year or who are interested in finding out more about the school. More information will come home soon, but interested families can call the office if they would like a phone call when the event is scheduled.

ford students will continue to be enrolled as students until choosing otherwise (or completing 8th grade!). Three-Choice Selection is the process of assigning schools to students in MPS. Students list the three schools, in order of preference, where they would like to attend. Anyone who completes the form during the enrollment period has an equal chance to be chosen for a school. The majority of students who participate in this process will be accepted into their first-choice school. Students who are not accepted into their first-choice school will be placed on a waiting list for that school, should seats open up. Nearly all students who participate in the three-choice process by January 29th are placed in one of the schools listed on their selection form as one of their top three choices.

It is well known that the source of most new students at Hartford University School is current students and their families. If you ask Hartford families how they chose Hartford, you would hear many of them say that they heard good things about Hartford from friends, neighbors, relatives. Now is the time to encourage your friends and relatives to register for Hartford. The seats at Hartford fill up fast, and waiting lists develop at nearly every grade. Families who wait until spring or summer to register will likely find Hartford full. Applications are available in the office. Please consider:

- Families interested in Hartford are encouraged to take a tour while school is in session. To set up a personal tour, encourage parents to call Mr. Humpa in the office at 906-4700 to schedule an appointment with Dr. Ellwood. A parent who shows up unannounced may be disappointed if Dr. Ellwood is unavailable or out of the building. Parents who would just like to look around are encouraged to stop by during the school day on Wednesday, January 20th. You can also encourage them to visit during Snuggle Up and Read on January 28th (see page 4).
- Hartford is a Neighborhood Specialty School. Students in the neighborhood have first priority, but students from anywhere in the city can choose to attend Hartford if seats are available.
- Hartford is school #208. It is located in the Riverside transportation district, but as a Neighborhood Specialty School provides transportation from anywhere between one to seven miles away.
- The application has room for families to make three choices of school. The names of students who
 do not get into their first choice are automatically put on that school's wait list. Children are not
 automatically put on the wait list for their 2nd or 3rd choice.
- When allocating limited available seats, MPS does consider whether or not a new student already
 has a sibling at Hartford. Be sure to fill in the Sibling ID information on the application for the
 brother or sister of students who are already at Hartford.

Winter Weather

Winter is finally here, and it is important to be ready for it. Make sure that your children are dressed properly each day. Even if the weather may not seem too terribly bad where you live, remember that it may be cooler or windier at the school. Also remember that the temperature can easily drop 10 to 15 degrees during the school day. Winter jackets, hats, gloves, and snow pants are a must when the temperature drops below freezing. Additionally, consider putting away the short-sleeved shirts and skirts for winter. The Hartford building is an old and drafty building that can be difficult to keep warm or to warm up quickly.

If your child is missing a glove or hat, don't assume that it is gone forever. There is a large (and growing) pile of items in the Lost and Found in the hallway outside of the auditorium. Stop by and look for missing winter clothes. Consider labeling clothes to make them easier to identify.

You can sign up to receive text and/or e-mail alerts regarding closings within MPS (or any other school or business) as soon as they are announced to the media. Register at the site now to get timely text alerts before the next snowstorm. The service is free, though your regular text fees may apply.
